I would like to thank all those volunteers, who participated in our fall work project with the A.T.C. Mid-Atlantic Crew. Over twenty (20) S.A.T.C. volunteers contributed in excess of two hundred work hours to the side trail construction at Peter's Mountain Shelter, working together with the Crew volunteers. The work, itself, was technically involved—using a three point cable, pulley and winch system to move large, heavy rocks into position as steps on the steep trail to the spring. Altogether, approximately 85 steps were laid along, with much digging and filling.

A Sunday picnic lunch was provided by the Club, and set up by volunteers for everyone to share at the shelter and was enjoyed by all.

The extent of volunteerism shown by our club in the work project was extra impressive, considering the necessary change of work weeks in the schedule after the BUSH-WACK BULLETIN was mailed out to the members. It cannot be over emphasized of the continuing need for volunteers in our Club activities; whether it is a trail work trip, leading a hike, serving on a committee, presenting a program, etc. The point is, the Club

can only be successful in fulfilling its stated purposes as long as we have the volunteers, willing to give their time and energy freely. That's just one part of what the APPALACHIAN TRAIL EXPERIENCE is about.

AN EDITORIAL

Normally, as Editor, I refrain from making comments, but circumstances force me to break this practice on a subject of which I have some knowledge and expertise in regard to the proposal to change the orange blazes on the Tuscarora Trail to blue.

Back in 1954, when the Susquehanna Appalachian Trail Club was founded, Colonel Shumaker, the last President of the Pennsylvania Alpine Club, called me on the phone, gave me some pitfalls to avoid, and then offered our club the Darlington Trail to maintain. The Darlington Trail was founded in about 1906, and ran from Overview on Blue Mountain to the King's Trail, near Chambersburg. We could only locate it from Overview to Sterritts Gap, finding it signed but devoid of blazes.

On advice of Jean Stephenson, we blazed it in blue, only to find that blue on access trails, trails to springs and to the one shelter, was confusing to hikers, causing them to lose their way. Under Ruth Bolla's administration, as President of this Club, the color was changed to a pale pink, called Flamingo pink.

When the Tuscarora Trail was conceived, Dr. Maurice Goddard gave approval for construction through State Park and Forest lands, with the provision that <u>blue</u> not be used, and suggested airplane orange instead.

We do not know Dr. Goddard's reason for this limitation, but we do know our Club's stand, and we, gladly, switched to the orange. And, we do not want to go back to blue on a Trail the length of the Darlington Trail.

Had the Keystone Trail Association properly assigned a Committee to look into this situation, and report back, we are confident that the Committee would have discovered the reasons for the orange blazes, and that the result would have been different.

Or, if the Club proposing the change in color had only talked with the other Clubs' involved, our representative would have been able to better explain the reason for the orange blazes--rather than be caught flat-footed.

We are disappointed in this evidence of one Club's failure to cooperate with other clubs, trying rather to run the show in the usual high-handed manner. This is what resulted in the Cumberland Valley fiasco, resulting in the loss of some five years in promoting the cause of the Trail interests.
